

## Is your club hosting Online Meetings?

#### Read about Jamie Ogborn's experience:

It was mid-March, Spring was just beginning, many were taking trips to warmer places and others were competing to make their way to the world stage. As if the world had stopped, everyone had to decide whether to cancel or go online for all of their events. As someone who never slows down, it isn't a shock that I have found a way to adapt most of my social interactions in a virtual setting, from work, to Easter dinner, to Toastmasters meetings and contests, to happy hours, to a kid's camp. It's safe to say I have learned a few things from my journey. Continued . . .

The first thing that I learned is that less is not more and more is not better. Living out in the woods and being at home alone for most of the shutdown thus far, I did feel a lot of anxiety in the few weeks when I had limited social interaction. I also struggled the first couple of weeks with a different schedule. Things like Toastmasters helped keep me around positive and energetic people and kept me busy and on a schedule. I learned very quickly, though, what "Zoom fatigue" was all about as virtual happy hours and contests were a nightly occurrence for a while and my Saturday mornings were booked for three months straight.

This is not just true for single individuals. Parents are having to care for and entertain their kids while still being productive at work and are dreading the thought of potentially having to be teachers on top of that again. Many couples are trying to figure out their office situations so that they can still get their work done without being in each other's way. Essential workers are often doing more work in less time with more equipment to deal with and risks to their health and their family. Laid off workers are trying to figure out how to get a job in this climate and how to pay the bills. The need for Toastmasters doesn't go away at this time, but the needs of individual members may have changed. They may need a different time/day or more flexibility. They may need to work on some different skills that are now essential to get the next job or be effective in the current environment. They may need the social interaction.

The second thing that I learned is that the virtual meeting software that one uses doesn't matter a lot. Zoom is a common software for Toastmasters clubs as it is fairly easy and is free for 45 min meetings. (You can set up 2 meetings if you want to do an hour-long meeting with a break in the middle.) Also, Zoom is used at district events. Skype, Teams, and WebEx are common for corporate clubs as they tend to use the software that their employers use. This allows members to attend the meetings on their work computers instead of having to switch back and forth throughout the day and allows people to get better with the virtual meetings that they need to be effective at work. As long as the software you use allows all of your members to join, allows you to connect with video and audio clearly and allows you to share your screen, it will work.

I also learned that the first meeting takes some patience. It takes 10-15 minutes to get everyone in and settled the first time. After that, more people start signing on 5-10 minutes before the meeting and it takes less time. You will have to decide how you will do everything online. Do you have electronic forms for evaluations? Many teams have had the speaker email their Pathways evaluation to the whole club instead of just the evaluator to allow people to give written feedback. Other clubs just have members email free form text back to speakers with their feedback.

How will you show the time? Some clubs have the timer show a green, yellow, and red item in front of their camera. This works if it's easy to see the camera. If you have a lot of people and software that doesn't let you pin a video to the front, this can be challenging. Some clubs send a message in the chat stating green, yellow, and red. This works if you have the chat function and if everyone has it up. My preference is to use a timing app. I like <a href="https://tmtimer.calebgrove.com/">https://tmtimer.calebgrove.com/</a>. The timer would bring each color up as a shared screen. This doesn't work if the speaker also wants to share screen or if the timer's software does not have enough power to share "backgrounds." There are also clubs that have the timer simply hold up 1, 2 and 3 fingers or give verbal timing cues.

You also can't give awards out virtually. Some clubs have chosen to announce awards, some have images of awards or certificates that they share on the screen, emailing or mailing them later. In addition, many clubs have networking time during the meeting. Anyone who has gone to a large virtual happy hour knows that socializing with a large group in a virtual session does not work well. Some software such as Zoom, and WebEx have the option to create breakout rooms that you can use to set members and guests into smaller rooms during those parts of the meeting.

Many clubs have asked what the role is for Sergeant at Arms since they don't have to set up a room. A great role to have in every online meeting is serving as Host. This role opens the meeting, helps with any issues people have getting in, manages the waiting room if you have one, manages the chat, manages recordings and/or breakout rooms as appropriate and makes sure that the meeting runs smoothly. I have also found it helpful for this person to email the meeting link to everyone within an hour before the meeting as this puts it to the top of the inbox where it is easy to find. This can be a good role for the Sergeant at Arms if comfortable with the software.

The last discovery that I have made is that online meetings are FUN if people want to have fun. I highly recommend still having a theme for every meeting. Table topics and speeches bring life to any meeting, virtual or live. Playing with the backgrounds can be fun as well. In one of my club's meetings we all reported from a different Star Wars location. Another club has given excellent feedback and tips to members to help them be better virtual presenters. We have seen tips on everything from backgrounds to lighting to framing to limiting glare on glasses to how to make people feel as if you are speaking just to them.
